RED CROSS FOOD PARCELS

The service is delighted to be shortlisted for a COSLA award in the category of 'Strengthening Communities and Local Democracy'. This is for our partnership with the British Red Cross, delivering winter food parcels to the city's most vulnerable residents and socially isolated service users.

Robert Murray, Home Care Service Manager says "We ran the project through the winter period up until March. It involved our community-based workers including home carers and wider HSCP partners identifying service users who were struggling over the winter months and at risk of food poverty.

"We used a straightforward referral process to highlight the service users in need so that the British Red Cross were able to organise a food parcel delivery for them. As part of the process, it was recognised there was a demand for a specific food parcel tailored to families.

"The food parcel was an immediate short-term solution providing two days of food. Signposting details to 'Glasgow Helps' were included along with the parcel, so the service user could access further longer-term support. Over the period, the project delivered around 500 food parcels across Glasgow."

We will find out on 28 September at an awards ceremony in Crieff if we are successful.

THE HERBERT PROTOCOL

The Herbert Protocol is a national scheme introduced by the police in partnership with other agencies to encourage carers to compile useful information which could be used to help locate a vulnerable person if they go missing.

Carers, family or friends of a vulnerable person, or the person themselves, can fill in a Herbert Protocol form in advance, containing information to help the police. We have previously written to service users attaching the Herbert protocol form to complete. If you haven't

already received a form, please let us know and we can send you one. Please can you complete it with your family member if they are at risk of this (i.e. have a condition affecting their cognition and who have

RECRUITMENT DRIVE FOR HOME CARERS

Did you catch our new recruitment advert on STV earlier this year? Starring our home care staff Megan, Deborah, Nicole and David, the advert carried the new strapline 'Become a carer for life, in a career for life'.

Gordon Bryan, Head of Care Services said "The recruitment campaign ran to help boost our staffing numbers, we have various front line roles in the service to offer those seeking employment. As well as running our advert on STV it was also supported by targeted ads on social media channels and outdoor screens across the city.

"The advert promoted the benefits of a career in home care, highlighting aspects including job security and potential career progression within the service. the ability to leave the house.) Keeping a completed form means you don't have to try to remember the information when you are under stress if someone goes missing. And it saves time, so we can start the search sooner.


