SIGNIFICANT CASE REVIEWS

<u>Glasgow Adult Support and Protection Committee Significant Case Review In Respect of</u> <u>Adult B</u>

Significant case reviews are important for those individuals, families and agencies in involved in critical incidents and to promote learning across agencies. This case was referred to Glasgow City's Adult Support and Protection Committee following the death of Adult B.

Glasgow Child Protection Committee Significant Case Review in Respect of Child D

Following the tragic circumstances leading to the death of Child D, Glasgow Child Protection Committee took the decision to undertake a Significant Case Review (SCR) in accordance with the National Guidance for Child Protection Committees: Conducting Significant Case Reviews (Scottish Government, March 2015). The guidance specifies that an SCR is a multiagency process for establishing the facts of and learning lessons from, a situation where a child under the age of 18 years has died or been significantly harmed.

Call to keep supporting people who want to shield

The Scottish government should continue to support people who are most at-risk of covid-19 and make a "personal choice" to start shielding again, the Director of Glasgow University's Institute of Health has said.

Researchers: Time for action on long Covid

A group of Scottish academics are calling for urgent government funding for the assessment, treatment and rehabilitation of people experiencing the long-term effects of covid-19 in Scotland. They warn that available services are not universally available, with many long Covid sufferers and healthcare professionals unaware of what is on offer.

Mental Health Services During the First Wave of the COVID-19 Pandemic in Europe

The findings from a survey of a large European sample of psychiatrists on their clinical experience of the impact of COVID-19 pandemic on the treatment of psychiatric patients during the month of April 2020.

Office for Statistics: Children and Young People Statistics in the pandemic

ONS looked at a selection of the key published data available on children and young people during the COVID-19 pandemic, in order to explore the representation of children and young people in official statistics since March 2020. We sought to understand how visible children and young people have been in key statistics, if they have been given a voice, and if the experiences of the most vulnerable have been collected and analysed separately.

Children, Young People & Education

Barnardo's Nightwatch Hotline

Barnardo's have launched a child sexual exploitation awareness social media campaign on Twitter, Facebook and LinkedIn targeting the night-time economy and promoting their Nightwatch hotline (provided jointly with Crimestoppers). The campaign was launched on Monday 9th Aug and will run for 4 weeks. It will run Scotland wide but with specific targeting of the Aberdeen, Dundee, Fife, Edinburgh and Glasgow areas.

Help for New Mums - New Telephone Breastfeeding Support Service

A new pilot telephone breastfeeding peer support service is being offered to support pregnant and new mums living in Glasgow City.

Systematic Review and Meta-Analysis of Policies, Programmes and Interventions That Improve Outcomes for Young People Leaving the Out-Of-Home Care System

What Works Centre for Children's Social Care has published an analysis of the effectiveness of interventions designed to improve outcomes for young people transitioning into adult living arrangements. A review of 15 studies reported in 25 papers involving care leavers aged between 16 and 25 looking at outcomes including homelessness, health, education, economic status and exposure to violence found that while certain policies and programmes have promise, there is insufficient evidence to draw conclusions about the effectiveness of any particular approach.

Glasgow University: Using 'Machine Learning' to measure attachment

Researchers led by the University of Glasgow have successfully used machine learning to measure attachment – the vital bond children develop as infants to their caregivers – for the

first time, which they say has the potential to be used in large-scale public health monitoring.

Youth Advisory Group for National Suicide Prevention Leadership Group

The NSPLG is launching a new Youth Advisory Group made up of young people (16–26) who have experience of suicide, self-harm or poor mental health. New Scottish Government guidance on supporting transgender pupils in schools

Ministers said the guidance was designed to help schools and education authorities "make decisions effectively". It also recognises the importance of "privacy and safe spaces" for girls and boys within schools. The Scottish government said the advice was not prescriptive and did not promote transitioning.

Pilot suicide bereavement support service launched in Scotland

Scotland's National Suicide Prevention Leadership Group (NSPLG) has launched a pilot service to support families bereaved by suicide. Established by the Scottish Government, NSPLG brings together people with lived experience of suicide alongside, academic, third sector, and statutory partners to support the delivery of Scotland's Suicide Prevention Action Plan: Every Life Matters.

Disability

National Disability Strategy

This strategy sets out the actions the UK government will take to improve the everyday lives of all disabled people.

Eyes.Scot Launch

A new Scottish Government website that brings together information on all aspects of visual impairment.

Learning disabilities and Scotland's labour market

Very few people with learning disabilities in Scotland are in paid work despite many being willing and able to do so. The Fraser Allan Institute's recent webinar on the subject invited discussion of how Scotland's labour market can be made more inclusive for people with learning disabilities. Citizens Advice Scotland warns of impending crisis for private renters

New data has been published which highlights an increase of renters in the private sector who have been struggling to make ends meet throughout the pandemic, with concerns that this could lead to more rent arrears and even evictions after Covid-linked support is withdrawn.

Perfect storm for the most vulnerable as they face massive energy bill hike

Struggling families will be hit hardest just as cold weather begins to bite. A price cap for domestic energy deals will be raised by 12% in October to cover suppliers' extra costs, regulator Ofgem has announced. This means that the typical gas and electricity customer is likely to see their bill go up by £139 to £1,277 a year.

A time of need: Exploring the changing poverty risk facing larger families in the UK

A report from the Centre for Analysis of Social Exclusion that explores the changing poverty risk facing larger families in the UK.

Gender Based Violence

Adapting Service Delivery during COVID-19: Experiences of Domestic Violence Practitioners

COVID-19 rapidly altered patterns of domestic and family violence, increasing the complexity of women's needs, and presenting new barriers to service use. This article examines service responses in Australia, exploring practitioners' accounts of adapting service delivery models in the early months of the pandemic.

Court Ordered Child Contact in Scotland guidance booklet

Glasgow Women's Aid have co-produced this guidance with with survivors of domestic abuse. The booklet helps to explain the Court Ordered Child Contact process within the family court system to survivors of domestic abuse - giving helpful and supportive guidance directly from women experienced in this process.

In collaboration with the Scottish Child Law Centre, the Children and Young People's Centre for Justice (CYCJ) has produced 'Representing care experienced children & young people in police custody: A good practice guide', a new resource to support Scottish solicitors and practitioners with Good Practice Principles when representing care experienced children in police custody, to ensure their rights are upheld.

Fifty-two prisoners in close supervision units 'that may amount to torture'

Fifty-two people are being held in prison units in England and Wales in conditions that a UN human rights expert has said may amount to torture, the Guardian has learned.

Social Care & Practice

National Care Service consultation open

Scottish Government has launched its public consultation to seek views ahead of the creation of a National Care Service. It sets out some of the options for delivering social care that empowers people to thrive. It recognises that significant cultural and system change will need to be supported by new laws and new ways of working.

At a minimum, the new National Care Service will cover adult social care. However, the consultation also asks whether its scope should be extended to other groups such as children and young people, community justice, alcohol and drug services, and social work.

Everyone is encouraged to take part in the consultation, which includes the consultation survey and a series of online consultation events in August September and October, before the consultation closes on 18 October.

COSLA Response to Consultation on a National Care Service

The Consultation on the National Care Service which was launched today cuts straight through the heart of the way Scotland is governed, said COSLA President Councillor Alison Evison.

HSCP Demographics Profile 2021

Glasgow HSCP's Demographics Profile for 2021 is now available. The profile is used as a reference tool to help plan and deliver services. It includes information on Glasgow City's current and projected population by age, gender and ethnicity at locality and city levels. It also includes information on life expectancy, mortality and physical and mental health, as well as factors that impact health and wellbeing including lifestyle and behaviours, education and poverty and deprivation. Information on social care needs and provision within the city is also included.

SSSC Communications Strategy 2021-2023

The Scottish Social Services Council lays out their new communications strategy, with a focus on influence, involvement, value and connection in their work with social work, social care and early years sector.

Research Project: Developing a Care Home App

Researchers from Strathclyde University look to develop an app to enhance person-centred care within care homes, and are looking to engage with people who have experience working within this setting to aid in its design.

PHINS webinar series - September/October 2021

As with last year, in 2021 we are hosting three online webinars in place of the annual PHINS seminar. These will run from the end of September to mid-October.

Peers are Partners: expanding naloxone provision across Scotland; 27/08/21, 1:00 - 3:15

Scottish Drugs Forum received funding from the Drug Deaths Taskforce to maximise peer to peer naloxone supply with a coordinated and supported approach by delivering high quality training, providing ongoing support and developing a national peer network to enhance the delivery of naloxone provision. Importantly, this includes paying peers as sessional workers. In this webinar SDF will hear about the progress of these funded projects, and other projects from across the country, from the peers and other staff involved in their delivery.
