Children in families with limited resources Scotland 2017-2019

Experimental statistics on 'Children in families with limited resources Scotland 2017-2019' were released by Scotland's Chief Statistician today. This statistical release provides local estimates for the proportion of children in families with limited resources by local authority area and household characteristics. The purpose of the limited resources local measure is to provide local area breakdowns to inform local planning.

Rate of mental disorders among children remained stable in 2021 after previous rise, report shows

A survey published by NHS Digital found one in six children in England had a probable mental disorder in 2021 – a similar rate to 2020 but an increase from one in nine in 2017.

The UK Supreme Court ruled that 4 aspects of the UNCRC (Incorporation) (Scotland) Bill are out with the competence of the Scottish Parliament. This means the Bill must go back to the Scottish Parliament to be amended. Happily, the Court were clear that giving effect to international human rights treaties is very much within the Scottish Parliament's remit, the issues identified were related to devolution.

By 2023 Scottish Government has an expectation of all local authorities to be providing restorative justice services within a range of settings.
