



Public Protection Bulletin 5th March 2025

Dear colleague,

Glasgow City Community Planning Partnership has been notified that the Care Inspectorate, Education Scotland, His Majesty's Inspectorate of Constabulary in Scotland, and Healthcare Improvement Scotland will undertake a joint Inspection of services for children and young people at risk of harm in Glasgow City.

The inspection will consider the period 17 February 2023 – 17 February 2025 and will consider the extent to which services, working together, can demonstrate the following:

- children and young people are safer because risks have been identified and responded to effectively
- children and young people's lives improve with high-quality planning and support, ensuring they experience sustained loving and nurturing relationships to keep them safe from harm
- children, young people and their families are meaningfully and appropriately involved in decisions about their lives. They influence service planning, delivery, and improvement
- collaborative strategic leadership, planning and operational management ensure high standards of service.

The Public Protection Team will keep you up to date throughout the process by way of a fortnightly newsletter. The first edition of the newsletter will be published shortly so please keep an eye on your inbox.

As usual, this edition carries a full range of research, articles, activities, and events covering the full spectrum of public protection.

Adults, Older People & Dementia

Where Do We Draw the Line? Perceptions of Abuse of Older Adults and Their Association with Ageism

Violence against older adults is a prevalent global harm, and there is evidence that perceptions of violence toward older adults may affect reporting and intervention. The present study examines the perception of violence against older adults in contrast to violence against other age groups and investigates the role of ageism in those perceptions.

Meaningful Connection: Findings from consultations with family carers of people who live in care homes

The Care Inspectorate undertook consultations with family carers of people experiencing care in adult and older people's care homes in Scotland to help ensure they are hearing their voices and to widen knowledge of their experiences and views.

<u>Delayed Discharge in Glasgow Linked to Lack of Power of Attorney in a Third of</u> Cases

NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde is calling on the public to organise Power of Attorney for welfare matters. Statistics show that around a third of patients are delayed in their discharge from hospital because they do not have one in place.

<u>Scottish Government Set to Miss Target of Abolishing Non-Residential Care Charges</u>

The Scottish government looks set to miss its target of ending charging by councils for non-residential care services by the next Holyrood election despite acknowledging that the current system has a "significant impact" on the lives of disabled and vulnerable people.

<u>Joint Inspection of Adult Support and Protection: Review of progress in the Western</u> <u>Isles partnership area</u>

This progress review was carried out by the Care Inspectorate, Healthcare Improvement Scotland and His Majesty's Inspectorate of Constabulary in Scotland, following a previous joint inspection of adult support and protection conducted in 2023. The review relates to inspection findings where important areas of weakness outweighed strengths. The aim of the review was to provide assurance about the extent to which improvement has progressed.

Children, Young People & Families

Co-designing Glasgow's All Age Childcare Final Report

GCVS, in partnership with Glasgow City Council, Daisy Chain, 3D Drumchapel and Early Years Scotland have published a final report with the findings from a co-design project on the future of an all ages childcare system.

NSPCC Podcast: Mental health first aid kits

By recognising when a child is struggling with their mental health, and intervening to provide appropriate support, professionals working with children can help prevent mental health problems from escalating into crisis. This mental health first aid kit contains a selection of resources to help young people manage their mental health if they're struggling, such as ways to distract oneself, relax or calm down, and pointers to further support.

Keeping Children Safe in Scotland: Guides for younger children, young people and parents and carers

This website has been created to provide information about keeping younger children and young people safe in Scotland. It includes separate sections for children, young people and parents or carers.

Racial Disproportionality in Violence Affecting Children and Young People

A report from Youth Endowment Fund that looks at the over-representation of children from some minority ethnic communities in the youth justice system and presents evidence-informed approaches that have potential for both reducing disproportionality and reducing violence.

Identifying and Responding to Child Sexual Abuse in the Family Environment
An article from Research in Practice about the challenges associated with identifying and responding to child sexual abuse in the family. The article was published in response to a report, "I Wanted Them All To Notice" by The Child Safeguarding Practice Review Panel, which explores how multi-agency safeguarding systems respond to child sexual abuse (CSA).

<u>Viewing Generative AI and Children's Safety in the Round: Research and recommendations for Government and technology companies</u>

New research from the NSPCC report looks at how Generative AI is impacting children's safety and wellbeing. Some of the risks include sexual grooming, sexual extortion and exposure to harmful content. The report sets out potential solutions and calls for the Government to adopt key actions including embedding a duty of care in legislation.

Information Toolkit for Parents and Carers on Bullying

An updated toolkit from Anti-Bullying Alliance designed to give parents and carers information about bullying, tips about what to do if they are worried about bullying, and how to talk to children about bullying.

Whole Family Wellbeing Funding (WFWF) Programme - Year 2: Process and impact evaluation

This process evaluation from the Scottish Government assessed how the WFWF was designed and delivered. It explored questions such as: was the initiative delivered as intended, what worked well or less well (for whom and why), what could be improved, and what can be learnt for related future initiatives. The Year 2 evaluation also includes an impact evaluation. There is also a summary report.

Short Changed and Out of Time: A report into facing financial harms alone

This report from Parent Zone explores the current level of parental understanding of online child financial harms (CFH).

Children's Social Work Statistics: Secure care 2023-24

Secure Care Statistics for Scotland for 2023-24 that cover data on children in secure care accommodation in Scotland.

Language in the Hearing Room

An article from Children's Hearing Scotland about their involvement in the multipartner Children's Hearings Improvement Partnership group <u>Language Leaders</u>. Language Leaders has young people with lived experience at the centre of its work,

A report from a Scottish Government-commissioned Independent Working Group with recommendations for strategic and sustainable cross-cutting approaches focusing on prevention and early intervention resolutions; partnerships; and support for victims, communities and people involved with antisocial behaviour.

Disability, Learning Difficulties & Neurodiversity

Moving From Institutions to Independent Living

The Scottish Human Rights Commission has published a report which highlights that people with learning disabilities and autistic people in Scotland are still being held in institutions in breach of their human rights. On their website, there is access to the full report, a summary report, an easy read report and an easy read toolkit.

<u>Inaccessible, Unacceptable and Unaccountable: The provision of paediatric</u> continence supplies in England, Wales and Scotland

This research report from Cerebra concerns the way that the health and care services in England, Scotland and Wales respond to the continence care needs of disabled children. Its particular focus is on the provision of containment products (such as nappies, pads and 'pull ups').

Education

<u>Summary Statistics for Attainment and Initial Leaver Destinations, No. 7: 2025</u> edition

This statistical publication from the Scottish Government provides information on the educational attainment and initial destinations of 2023-24 school leavers from publicly funded schools in Scotland.

Equality & Poverty

Transport Poverty: A public health issue

Public Health Scotland has published a briefing on behalf of the Public Health and Sustainable Transport Partnership Group. The briefing describes a multidimensional definition of transport poverty developed in collaboration with health and transport experts. It outlines the causes of transport poverty within and beyond the transport

system and details how transport poverty can influence health and health inequalities.

The Robertson Trust Community Spaces Grants Now Open

Community Spaces aims to support local communities experiencing poverty and trauma in Scotland and is for registered charities with an annual income of between £30,000 and £500,000. Applicants can apply at any time and there is no set closing date for applications. The fund will provide revenue funding of between £5,000 and £20,000 per year, for up to 3 years, to support the costs of community centres, hubs and anchor organisations that are delivering and/or hosting a range of services and activities to meet the needs of their community.

Mortality Inequalities Are Widening in Cities Across the UK

Death rates in the most deprived areas of cities in England and Scotland have been increasing since the start of the last decade, widening inequalities between the richest and poorest in society.

Households Living Below a Minimum Income Standard: 2008–2023

The 12th report from the Joseph Rowntree Foundation in a series monitoring the number of people living beneath the Minimum Income Standard in the UK.

Review of the UK Material Deprivation Measures

A report from the Department of Work and Pensions which contains the findings and recommendations from a review of the UK material deprivation measures.

Glasgow City Health & Social Care Partnership Demographics and Needs Profile

The profile contains the latest information available at the time of writing and includes general population estimates by age, gender and ethnicity, as well as population projections at city, locality and national levels. It also contains a profile of health in the city with information on life expectancy and mortality; patterns of illness and disease; and factors that impact upon health and wellbeing, including lifestyles, social capital, deprivation, education and employment.

Child Protection Lead Online Training - 05/03/25 - 10am-3pm

Children In Scotland are offering training on the role of child protection leads within organisations. To recognise the abuse of power and respond effectively to it and to understand the experience of gender-based violence in all its forms. This session is for NHS SARCS, Police & Prison workforce and the wider partners included in these Networks.

CPC Scotland, with support from CELCIS and the Scottish Government, continues to deliver the 'Learning About Neglect' webinar series, with the next event taking place on Thursday 13 March. Adult Support and Protection Multi Agency Training Awareness Webinar

A multi-agency webinar delivered by Learning and Development, Glasgow HSCP (Health and Social Care Partnership) to support practitioners to gain a basic understanding of Adult Support and Protection (ASP) legislation. It may be used as a basic awareness or if you already have some knowledge of ASP and wish to refresh your skills. This is a multi- agency awareness session and will webinar-based with a maximum of 60 participants. There will not be a waiting list so if you are unsuccessful you will require to reserve an alternative date. Participants will:

- develop their understanding of what we mean by an adult at risk within the context of the Adult Support and Protection (Scotland) Act 2007
- define who may be an adult at risk of harm
- recognise forms of harm adults may experience
- know how to report their concerns
- explain their responsibility in relation to Adult Support and Protection.

Working Together to Support People Living at Home with Neurological Conditions

The Care Inspectorate and NHS Ayrshire and Arran have worked together on this project, which brought people living with a neurological condition into the heart of a new network, working together with the care and health professionals who support them to live at home. The approach reinforces the importance of cooperation and communication between those providing a care or health service and those receiving it. They have published a report of their project.

Specialist Care Homes for People Experiencing Homelessness

Maree Todd, Minister for Mental Wellbeing, told the Scottish Parliament she had requested visits and recommendations for improvements in response to the programme.

National Confidential Inquiry Into Suicide and Safety in Mental Health: Annual report 2025

The 2025 annual report from the National Confidential Inquiry into Suicide and Safety in Mental Health (NCISH) provides findings relating to people aged 10 and above who died by suicide between 2012 and 2022 across the UK (England, Northern Ireland, Scotland and Wales) and Jersey.

Practice, Organisation & Workforce Matters

<u>Good Practice in Artificial Intelligence (AI) in healthcare: The rights and wrongs – event report</u>

The ALLIANCE and Scottish Al Alliance produce a DigiFest24 report with actions and recommendations across the digital health and care sector.

Care Inspectorate - Update on Self-Evaluation Pilot in Adult Care Services

Between October 2023 and June 2024, the Care Inspectorate worked with providers of adult care services to develop their skills around self-evaluation. This included holding three webinars, which were attended by more than 800 people, two face-to-face workshops with over 90 attendees, and a session with managers from a large provider. They have provided an update on the self-evaluation test inspections.

Test of Change - Integrated Inspection of Care at Home Standards

The Care Inspectorate will undertake an integrated inspection of care at home services in one selected health and social care partnership (HSCP) area in year 2025/26. This work involves combining and integrating strategic and regulatory approaches to inspection. It will help identify how commissioning processes in the selected HSCP area are supporting positive outcomes for people who experience care and their carers.

Delivering Together for a Stronger Nursing and Midwifery Workforce: The report and recommended actions of the Scottish Ministerial Nursing and Midwifery Taskforce
After two years of work and with the input of more than 4,000 nurses and midwives, the Nursing and Midwifery Taskforce has now published its final report. Its recommendations include a review of the financial support available to students, expanding the role of nurses and midwives in local and national planning, and improving entry routes to the profession – including 'earn as you learn' schemes.

Substance Use & Addiction

Alcohol and Drug Recovery Strategy 2024 - 2034

A strategy setting out how the Scottish Prison Service, working alongside partners, aims to reduce the supply of substances into its establishments, support people in their recovery journey, and create better environments for everyone to live and work.

Law Chage Needed for Scotland's Drug Crisis

A leading Scottish expert in substance use is calling for a change in UK legislation to support people struggling with drug use by expanding the safe consumption facilities being piloted across Scotland.
