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COMMUNITY JUSTICE SOCIAL WORK FINANCE: ADDITIONAL GRANT ALLOCATION

Purpose of Report:	To update the IJB and seek approval for proposed spend following notification from the Community Justice Division within the Scottish Government that Glasgow City was to receive an additional grant payment of £634,910. This would be in addition to the indicative funding as set out in the Community Justice Social Work (CJSW) Section 27 grant allocation for 2020-21.
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Background/Engagement:	The purpose of the additional funding is to bolster further the use of Bail Supervision, Diversion from Prosecution and Structured Deferred Sentences (SDS) in line with Community Justice priorities. The grant letter states that
	there is a need for CJSW to respond to the current COVID- 19 pandemic and gives scope to re-prioritise areas of
	intervention.

1. PURPOSE OF REPORT

- 1.1 On the 11 May 2020 Glasgow City HSCP received notification from the Community Justice Division within the Scottish Government that Glasgow City was to receive an additional grant payment of £634,910. This would be in addition to the indicative funding as set out in the Community Justice Social Work (CJSW) Section 27 grant allocation for 2020-21.
- 1.2 The conditions attached to the grant payment of £634,910 is that it must be spent within budget year 2020-21 and cannot be carried forwarded into 2021-22. Work has commenced to scope out funding proposals in line with Community Justice priorities, as the time remaining to spend the grant is limited.

2. BACKGROUND

2.1 The purpose of the additional funding is to bolster further the use of Bail Supervision, Diversion from Prosecution and Structured Deferred Sentences (SDS) in line with Community Justice priorities. However, the grant letter recognises and states that there is a need for CJSW to respond to the current COVID-19 pandemic and gives scope to reprioritise some areas of intervention.

The Cabinet Secretary for Justice therefore agreed that no such restrictions on the use of the additional funding will apply while the response to the COVID-19 pandemic is ongoing and that it can be used at the discretion of the local authority to support CJSW activity more generally. Each local authority has been given flexibility, working in partnership with other statutory partners and the third sector, to direct this funding to meet Community Justice local priorities.

The grant letter is clear that local authorities in partnership are free to allocate funds as they see fit across their LA in accordance with their Community Justice Outcome and Improvement Plans, in the way they see as most appropriate to fulfil their statutory obligations to prevent and reduce further offending.

3. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

- 3.1 The additional funding is intended for use specifically in relation to promoting early and effective interventions to reduce offending behaviour and avoid the use of short term prison sentences. In particular, this funding is to be linked to increasing the capacity of local authorities in relation to bail supervision, diversion from prosecution and structured deferred sentences.
- 3.2 Periodic local authority updates will be required starting in October 2020 and then in May 2021 to inform Scottish Ministers of how this funding has been utilised which in turn, will inform the work of the National Community Justice Leadership Group (cochaired by the Cabinet Secretary for Justice and COSLA).

- 3.4 The above proposal estimated costs totalling £470,000, which means there is shortfall at this time of £210,900. Work is ongoing to scope out other viable options such as IT and internet access for service users (enhancing Connecting Scotland proposal), options regarding accommodation, family work (via third sector), enhancing Domestic Abuse support, expansion of Recreate (Volunteering Service), expansion of Sacro garden project and PPE reserve fund for personal placement unpaid work providers.
- 3.5 Given the tight timescales to spend the grant allocation tight governance arrangements will be implemented to review the progress being made and to identify spend. There is a need to monitor the pace of this activity and to ensure momentum is maintained.
- 3.6 If any specific funding for those services or programmes identified above is not utilised, the local authority remains accountable and the Scottish Government will initiate discussions about whether the same amount of funding should continue to be provided for that same purpose.
- 3.7 In April 2021, the final monthly grant payment will be released following examination of the final quarterly report which will confirm spend to date. The Director of Finance will be required to confirm that the terms and conditions of the grant have been complied with.

4. CONTRACTING AND COMMISIONING OF SERVICES

4.1 A number of the above proposals involve the recruitment of staff to bolster existing Community Justice Social Work Services which would be progressed via Work Force Planning and CBS Recruitment. The peer mentoring service proposal will be commissioned under Lot 6 of the Community Justice Tendering arrangements. The Sacro and Neighbourhood Sustainability unpaid work associated COVID spend would be made to existing contracted justice service providers and would be managed as part of the contract and commissioning framework. The remaining spends would be one off spends the highest value being circa. £20K approved in line with the revised scheme of delegation.

5. CHALLENGES

- 5.1 It must be acknowledged that the ability to adhere to the conditions as set out by Scottish Government to spend this additional grant payment of £634,910 in the current financial year 2020-21 will be immensely challenging.
- 5.2 This matter is further compounded by the challenges brought about by COVID 19 placing further restrictions on our ability to recruit and mobilise the necessary infrastructure within the designated timeframe.
- 5.3 It should also be acknowledged that key interdependencies with COVID 19 recovery planning arrangements with third sector, commissioning services and courts will also impede our ability to progress spend within the designated timeframe.

6. **RECOMMENDATIONS**

 - b) approve the proposed spends in principle allowing for some discretion pending final developments and costings;
 - c) agree the governance arrangements to support this activity;

 - e) Support the requirement to confirm the challenges directly with Scottish Government.
