The service model will promote ongoing inclusion of service users in making decisions that affect them through active, free and meaningful participation. Routine monitoring or service delivery will include review against aligned policies promoting user feedback. Non-discrimination will be addressed through service delivery that complies with the Equality Act 2010 and the related specific duties. This means that an equitable approach will be taken to meeting the needs of service users and that service users will be given full support to realise their rights as stakeholders in delivery of services. The above will be underpinned by an understanding that human rights are legal rights and that design and delivery of services will transparently uphold this at all times.
