

GLASGOW ANNUAL PERFORMANCE REPORT 2016/17


SUMMARY

Overview

The Glasgow City Integration Joint Board (IJB) was established in February 2016 and provides strategic direction and leadership for community health and social care services in the city, which are jointly delivered through the Health and Social Care Partnership (HSCP). The IJB is required to publish an Annual Performance report and this summary focuses upon the key highlights from the 2016/17 report.

We opened a new health and care centre in Maryhill and commenced work on new ones in Gorbals and Woodside

We launched the Aye Mind digital development programme to promote mental health and wellbeing amongst young people.



Areas For Improvement




Service Quality

During the year, the Care Inspectorate undertook inspections across 42 HSCP units/services, with the overall quality of care assessed as 'Good' or better in 38 (90.5%) of cases.

A wider inspection of all citywide services provided to children by the HSCP and its partners was also undertaken. Services were assessed in relation to 9 Quality Indicators and were classified as either 'Good' or 'Very Good' in relation to 7 indicators and 'Adequate' in relation to the other 2.

Managing Our Resources

The total financial resources available to the Partnership for 2016-17 were approximately £1.1billion. The percentage allocation across care groups is shown below:

The IJB's accounts for 2016/17 note that, while the financial position continues to be challenging, a surplus of £19,309,000 was generated in 2016/17, of which £11,880,000 was earmarked for specific commitments in 2017/18. The balance of £7,429,000 will be carried forward as a general contingency to manage unanticipated budget pressures in future years.

Our Localities

The Partnership is divided into three areas, known as localities, to support operational service delivery and respond to local needs. These localities - North West, North East and South - are shown below.



During 2016/17, each locality established mechanisms for engaging with partners, GPs and other primary care professionals, and service user and carer networks. They also developed their own locality plans, which show how they will implement the HSCP's priorities and respond to local needs.

Equalities

As a Partnership, we aim to ensure that our services are provided in an equalities sensitive way and that any potential barriers to access are removed. We have established an Equality Group, involving the Glasgow Equality Forum and have published an Equalities Mainstreaming and Outcome Plan (2016-18), against which we will report upon progress going forward.
