1. Background

- 1.1 The Community Empowerment (Scotland) Act 2015 requires changes to the way in which community planning is delivered. Much of the legislation is geared towards making the work of public sector organisations mainstreamed within community planning arrangements and generally encouraging more integrated partnership working across the public sector. Whilst the merit and intent of these legislative changes is not in contest, the complexity of operationalising coherent partnership working in line with the Public Bodies Joint Working (Scotland) Act 2014, the Community Justice (Scotland) Act 2016 and the Community Empowerment (Scotland) Act 2015 is significant.
- 1.2 The Integration Joint Board on 31st October 2016 considered a report which outlined the new legal framework for community planning; the IJB's representation and engagement with the Community Planning Partnership; approved a number of aspects of the governance relationship between the IJB and the Community Planning Partnership; and, agreed a financial contribution to support the transition to new Community Justice arrangements. - 1.3 This paper provides an update on the transition arrangements for Community Planning in Glasgow, including the development of a Local Outcome Improvement Plan and associated Locality Plan(s) by October 2017. Glasgow City Council Executive Committee will consider a report on 16th February 2017 which includes the detail provided in this paper and the other statutory Partners' respective Boards

will likewise consider these arrangements with a view to ensuring a collective agreement on the direction of travel for Glasgow.

2. Transition Progress to Date

- 2.1 An officer-level Transition Group, chaired by the Chief Executive of Glasgow City Council, identified the following as requiring agreement between Community Planning Partners:
 - a) **Shared Priorities**; an initial high level mapping exercise has been undertaken to collate the *strategic priorities* across all the named community planning partners within the Community Empowerment (Scotland) Act, which includes the strategic priorities of the IJB as outlined within the Strategic Plan. Further discussion on the future shared priorities will take place to form specific requirements. These will be informed by feedback from consultation with communities and stakeholders.
 - b) Collective Responsibilities; There will be a dialogue with stakeholders on the current structural arrangements. Work is currently being undertaken to determine the optimum approach for engaging partnerships and identify the resource support to deliver on this. Proposals to amend the Governance Framework for Glasgow Community Planning Partnership will be brought forward. Analysis on the governance of the five named partners, including the IJB, is currently underway to understand best practice and any specific requirements made of these organisations that determine how they operate and what they are permitted to undertake.
 - c) *Ways of Working and Supporting Principles*; scoping has been undertaken on operating principles used across the individual community planning partners. These, as well as key national principles (such as Nolan and the National Standards for Community Engagement), and the existing Glasgow Community Planning Partnership principles have been utilised to develop draft principles for the Community Planning Partnership (CPP) as it refocuses on the Local Outcome Improvement Plan. These draft principles, will be tested through dialogue with partners, including the IJB.
 - d) Making Best Use of our Resources; this workstream is looking at how to build upon work undertaken in Thriving Place areas around asset mapping and resource planning e.g. the work in the Gorbals to look at more efficient use of resources within a locale and consideration of how resources are deployed by a particular organisation within that locale. This sought to provide a baseline position and methodology to understand and analyse the use of our resources around a small number of locally agreed priorities.

3. Consultation

3.1 The Community Planning Partnership held two events in June and November 2016 bringing together additional stakeholders to participate in preparing and planning for the transition, including the framework to develop the Local Outcome Improvement Plan. Input from Community Planning Partners, including officers from the Health and Social Care Partnership, has been used to shape proposals for the next steps of the transition programme.

4. Next Steps

- 4.1 Section 6(1) of the Community Empowerment (Scotland) Act 2015 requires each CPP to produce and publish a Local Outcome Improvement Plan to set out the CPP's shared vision based on agreed priorities. This will determine the way the Partnership operates, the improvements made, the pace of agreed change, how performance is managed and reported, and the governance and operating arrangements that underpin the CPP.
- 4.2 In terms of the Community Empowerment (Scotland) Act 2015, each Community Planning Partnership is required to identify which geographical areas have communities that experience the poorest outcomes, (S.9(3)), and to prepare and publish locality plans to improve outcomes on agreed priorities for these communities (S.10(1)).
- 4.3 The Community Planning Partnership is required to determine collectively where these localities are and what size they will be. Broad parameters have been provided by the Scottish Government. These are that;
 - Localities should be determined using evidence of local need, circumstance and opportunities; and
 - they should be based on a geographic area with a population that does not exceed 30,000.
- 4.4 CPPs may also agree to have 'thematic' as well as geographic locality plans. The Glasgow CPP will explore opportunities for thematic locality plans, e.g. around 'fairness' with particular reference to equalities. The initial Locality Plans should be produced by 30 September 2017.
- 4.5 Work will be undertaken by all of the Community Planning Partners to agree the necessary actions, associated timescales and necessary resources to deliver the Local Outcome Improvement Plan and Locality Plan(s), and these will be agreed collectively across the partners to ensure that the CPP can meet the timescales prescribed in the legislation.
- 4.6 The CPP officer group, which includes representation from the Health and Social Care Partnership, will undertake the following:
 - Completion of ongoing work to develop the proposals for structures and governance
 - Completion of ongoing work in relation to ways of working
 - Activity to prepare for, draft and consult on the Local Outcome Improvement Plan and Locality Plans; and
 - Delivery of a Communications Plan to ensure that shared and consistent messages regarding transition are appropriately managed.
- 4.7 Further updates will provided to the Integration Joint Board as this work progresses.

5. Recommendations
