1. Purpose of Report

1.1 To seek approval of Glasgow City Integration Joint Board's (IJB) draft Climate Change Duties Report 2016-17 to be submitted to the Scottish Government.

2. Background

- 2.1 The Scottish Parliament passed the Climate Change (Scotland) Act in 2009. Part 4 of the Act states that a "public body must, in exercising its functions, act: in the way best calculated to contribute to the delivery of (Scotland's climate change) targets; in the way best calculated to help deliver any (Scottish adaptation programme); and in a way that it considers most sustainable." The three elements of public bodies' climate change duties include:
 - mitigation reducing greenhouse gas emissions
 - adaptation adapting to the impacts of a changing climate and
 - acting sustainable sustainable development as a core value.
- 2.2 The Climate Change (Duties of Public Bodies: Reporting Requirements) (Scotland) Order 2015 came into force in November 2015 as secondary legislation made under the Climate Change (Scotland) Act 2009. The order requires public bodies to prepare reports on compliance with climate change duties. This includes 'an integration joint board established by order under section 9(2) of the Public Bodies (Joint Working) (Scotland) Act 2014(c).'

3. Glasgow City IJB Climate Change Duties Report 2016-17

- 3.1 Attached at Appendix A is Glasgow City IJB's draft Climate Change Duties Report 2016-17 proposed to be submitted to the Scottish Government with a deadline of 30 November 2017, and it covers the following seven areas:
 - profile of the reporting body;
 - governance, management and strategy;
 - emissions, targets and projects;
 - adaptation;
 - procurement;
 - validation and
 - wider influence.
- 3.2 Glasgow City IJB's draft Climate Change Duties Report has been completed in line with guidance published by the Sustainable Scotland Network (SSN) specifically for Integration Joint Boards, which is available at http://www.keepscotlandbeautiful.org/media/1559286/ijb-cc-reporting-master-guidance-final-v10-14-july-2017.pdf.
- 3.3 The guidance specifically recognises the unique nature of Integration Joint Boards, and that, in a lot of instances, the accountability and responsibility for climate change governance, management and strategy does not lie within Integration Joint Boards themselves but within their corresponding Local Authority and Health Board. Officers from Glasgow City HSCP and other Partnerships have

liaised with the Keep Scotland Beautiful Campaign, who manage this return on behalf of the Scottish Government, to assist them in understanding the nature of Integration Joint Boards and how this impacts on their ability to complete this return. It is expected that the outputs from these discussions will be reflected in guidance issued in future years.

- 3.4 Within Glasgow City, the accountability and responsibility for climate change governance, management and strategy (including risk management and reporting) in relation to the delivery of Council and Health Board services lies with Glasgow City IJB's partner statutory bodies, Glasgow City Council and NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde. It is not a devolved function of the Glasgow City IJB. Both Glasgow City Council and NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde submit a Public Bodies Climate Change Duties Report that detail this.
- 3.5 Glasgow City IJB's Climate Change Duties Report 2016-17 reflects the arrangements as set in Paragraph 3.4, and associated guidance for completing the Climate Change Duties Report makes clear that it is acceptable to state this in the report.
- 3.6 Whilst the accountability and responsibility for climate change governance, management and strategy within Glasgow City lies with the Council and Health Board, there is an opportunity for Glasgow City IJB and its Committees to take into consideration any implications in relation to climate change (where relevant) in reports to the Glasgow City IJB and its Committees. The cover pages of Glasgow City IJB reports promote identification of implications across a range of headings. Officers can be encouraged to use the heading of 'sustainability' to consider climate change implications including any risks and issues (where relevant). It is therefore proposed that future Glasgow City IJB and Committee reports rename the 'sustainability' implication heading as 'sustainability (including climate change).' This will also allow the Glasgow City IJB to report on any climate change implications identified in future Climate Change Duties Reports submitted to the Scottish Government.

In line with the Public Bodies (Joint Working) (Scotland) Act 2014 and further than the minimum requirements, Glasgow City Council and NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde have integrated the planning and delivery of all community health and social care services, including services for children, adults and older people, along with homelessness and criminal justice services. The strategic planning and monitoring of these services have been delegated by the Council and Health Board to the Glasgow City IJB, which then directs the Council and Health Board to deliver these services in line with its Strategic Plan and defined level of financial resources. Most services are for Glasgow City, but some cover the entire NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde Board area (for example, sexual health services).

The resident population of Glasgow City is 615,070 and NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde is 1,161,370 (NRS 2016 mid-year population estimates).

The accountability and responsibility for climate change governance, management and strategy in relation to the delivery of Council and Health Board services (including community health and social care) lies with Glasgow City IJB's partner statutory bodies, Glasgow City Council and NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde. Both Glasgow City Council and NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde submit a Public Bodies Climate Change Duties Report. We will continue to work with colleagues in the Council and Health Board to identify opportunities to operate more efficiently and sustainably. Details of specific activities and projects will be provided in their respective Climate Change Duties Reports

The accountability and responsibility for climate change governance in relation to the delivery of Council and Health Board services (including community health and social care) lies with Glasgow City IJB's partner statutory bodies, Glasgow City Council and NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde. The partner bodies have a Board (Glasgow City Council) or Planning and Implementation Group (NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde) linked to governance decision-making structures and other relevant groups (e.g., capital planning), which broadly oversee and co-ordinate strategic sustainability planning, climate change adaptation and service improvement, including risk management, communications/engagement activity with staff and the public, monitoring and performance reporting and scrutiny. Both Glasgow City Council and NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde submit a Public Bodies Climate Change Duties Report that will detail this, but the arrangements are broadly outlined below.

Glasgow City Council

The Council has a number of climate change mitigation and adaptation initiatives, which are fed into the Carbon Management Board and/or the Sustainable Glasgow Board (which has been chaired by the Leader of the Council).

During 2016-17, formal reporting was provided to the Council's Sustainability and Environment Policy Development Committee, with strategic decisions reported to the Executive Committee.

NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde

The Health Board has in place a Sustainability Planning and Implementation Group, chaired by the Director of Property and Facilities Management, who is also the Board's Sustainability Champion. The Group is integral to the work of the Capital Planning Group.

The accountability and responsibility for the management of decision-making for climate change action in relation to the delivery of Council and Health Board services (including community health and social care) lies with Glasgow City IJB's partner statutory bodies, Glasgow City Council and NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde. Both Glasgow City Council and NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde submit a Public Bodies Climate Change Duties Report that will detail this more fully, but the arrangements are broadly outlined below.

Glasgow City Council

The Executive Director, Land Environmental Services is the Council's Green/Sustainability Champion. The work is driven by the Head of Sustainability and various workstreams including Sustainable Glasgow, Resilient Glasgow, City Energy and Carbon Management. Specifically the Climate Change officer sits in the Environment and Strategy Team.

The Head of Sustainability (who is also the Glasgow City's Chief Resilience Officer) chairs a number of internal meetings to discuss strategic decisions across the Council in relation to climate change mitigation and/or adaptation. These include the Carbon Management Board, Resilient Glasgow Steering Group and the Senior Officer's Group on Sustainability and the Environment (which include representatives from all Council services and the wider Council family). The Council uses the Climate Change Assessment Tool (CCAT) to facilitate interdepartmental engagement and assessment.

NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde

NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde Sustainability Manager is responsible for sustainability and environmental issues and reports to the General Estates Manager for Greater Glasgow and Clyde. The Sustainability Manager provides professional support (including leadership and expert technical and managerial advice) to the Health Board to identify, plan, develop and implement strategies, policies and guidance to improve the Health Board's performance on national and NHS objectives for sustainable development, environmental management and climate change, including performance monitoring, reporting and improvement action planning and the formulation and development of policies, protocols and procedures.
