Purpose of Report:	To advise the IJB of updates to the Integration Scheme, which have been agreed by Glasgow City Council and NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde
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Background/Engagement:	<p>Under the terms of the Public Bodies (Joint Working) (Scotland) Act 2014, Local Authorities and Health Boards must have in place an Integration Scheme, which is the legally binding agreement between the Health Board and the Council on the arrangements for integration of health and social care.</p> <p>The Integration Scheme between Glasgow City Council and NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde was approved by the Council and Health Board in December 2015, and came into effect from 6 February by Order of the Scottish Parliament.</p>

1. Purpose

- 1.1 To advise the IJB of updates to the Integration Scheme, which have been agreed by Glasgow City Council and NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde.

2. Background

- 2.1 Under the terms of the Public Bodies (Joint Working) (Scotland) Act 2014, Local Authorities and Health Boards must have in place an Integration Scheme, which is the legally binding agreement between the Health Board and the Council on the arrangements for integration of health and social care.
- 2.2 The Integration Scheme between Glasgow City Council and NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde was approved by the Council and Health Board in December 2015, and came into effect from 6 February 2016 by Order of the Scottish Parliament.
- 2.3 The IJB reviewed a paper on 24 January 2018 regarding implementation of the Carers (Scotland) Act 2016 – available at <https://glasgowcity.hscp.scot/sites/default/files/publications/ITEM%20No%2008%20-%20Carer%20Act%20Implementation%20Update%20and%20Eligibility%20Criteria.pdf> – which noted that, as a consequence of that Act, the Integration Scheme between Glasgow City Council and NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde would require to be updated.

3. Updates to Integration Scheme As a Consequence of the Carers Act

- 3.1 In order to accommodate the requirements of the Carers Act, Health Boards and Local Authorities required to amend their Integration Schemes to include the new duties for delegation to Integrated Authorities put in place by the Carers (Scotland) Act 2016. These were technical changes which allow IJBs, Councils and Health Boards to continue to carry out the roles each already plays in delivering support to carers and to enable all parties to comply with the new legislation.
- 3.2 Papers have been approved by the Health Board and Council respectively regarding updates to the Integration Scheme, and are available at the below links. The paper presented to the Health Board covered the Integration Schemes with each of the 6 local authorities in the Greater Glasgow and Clyde area:
