1. Purpose of Report

1.1 To provide the Integration Joint Board with an update on progress to date for the Phase 1 Residential New Build Modernisation Programme for Children & Young People and to note approval for funding and implementation of a Phase 2 New Build and Refurbishment Programme.

2. Background

2.1 Since 2009 an ambitious programme has been developed, agreed and implemented to deliver 12 x new builds on existing sites and sites identified by the Council's Development and Regeneration Services. To date 10 new purpose built units have been successfully delivered across the city.

- 2.2 The success and high standards of the 10 new build units has brought more focus on the older, smaller retained units. Alongside this the overall age profile of young people in residential care is increasing with the Care Inspectorate questioning risk management in terms of the high number of 16+ young people sharing with younger children.
- 2.3 A report to Glasgow City Integration Joint Board on 21st March 2016 highlighted the budget pressures associated with increasing high cost purchased placements along with a slowing down in the number of applications to the Council for potential foster carers.

3. New Build and Refurbishment Proposal

- 3.1 On 24th November 2016, the Council's Executive Committee approved the proposal to build 3 new units to replace existing units and increase capacity within the units to 8 beds each along with a refurbishment of one of the existing units to a continuing care facility of two 2 x bedroom houses for care leavers.
- 3.2 Overall, the proposed facilities would deliver an increase of 10 new provided places, 6 within Children's Residential units and 4 within Continuing Care facilities. This would initially give us additional capacity of 10 provided residential placements, as the Continuing Care places would be filled by young people within existing provided residential units.
