1. Purpose

- 1.1. To consider the petition entitled 'Create Emergency Homeless Accommodation for Women and Children'.

2. Background

- 2.1 Glasgow City Integration Joint Board (IJB) established a Public Petitions process following approval at the IJB Public Engagement Committee on [13th September 2016](#).
- 2.2 Glasgow City IJB aims to provide good quality services that are easy to access and meet the health and social care needs of the people of Glasgow.
- 2.3 The public petitions process plays a key part in these aims by encouraging people to participate fully in the decision making process, either individually or as part of a group.

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- 2.4 The guidance makes clear what issues will be considered. A public petition should not be the first step for an individual or group to raise a complaint with the Integration Joint Board.
- 2.5 Once a petition meets the conditions outlined in the guidance, consideration of the petition sits within the remit of the IJB Public Engagement Committee.

3. Considerations

- 3.1 The IJB received a petition entitled 'Create Emergency Homeless Accommodation for Women and Children' on 1st May 2026 on behalf of individuals with 26 signatures verified in accordance with the criteria approved by the Public Engagement Committee regarding the submission of petitions.
- 3.2 A response was issued on 26th June 2026 to confirm the petition met the criteria for consideration and would proceed to the next scheduled meeting of the IJB Public Engagement Committee on 19th August 2026.
- 3.3 The Principal Petitioner's statement petition is set out in Appendix 1. The Principal Petitioner is Laura Jones, and she has indicated that she will represent the petitioners and wishes to make a statement to the Committee.
- 3.4 The petition was referred to Jim McBride, Head of Service (Homelessness and Complex Needs Service) to comment and for representation on behalf of the HSCP. Comments from the HSCP in response to the petition are detailed in Appendix 2.
- 3.5 Following consideration of a petition, the Committee will decide on the appropriate action to be taken within the approved guidance for dealing with public petitions as follows:
 - a) Agree the issue(s) raised deserves further action and agree to refer the petition, with any recommendations the committee deems appropriate, to the Integration Joint Board, an officer or another organisation; or
 - b) Agree the issue(s) raised does not merit further action.

We, the undersigned, urgently petition Glasgow City Council for improved provision of women-only emergency homeless accommodation and safe accommodation for families with children.

The latest official homelessness statistics for Glasgow revealed that ⁴⁵⁶~~428~~ women and ¹²²~~108~~ families with children are currently housed in unsuitable hotel/BnB temporary accommodation. The specific vulnerabilities of women—fleeing domestic abuse, violence, and exploitation—are not being adequately met by current mixed-sex provision. This failure is recognised by organisations such as Shelter and Engender, and by the Scottish government.

We demand the establishment of more dedicated, safe, women-only accommodation facilities. These must provide a sanctuary from the trauma and danger that many homeless women face, including those with children. The insecurity of unsuitable temporary accommodation has a devastating impact on family stability and child development.

Furthermore, this accommodation must be more than just a roof. It is imperative that wrap-around care and services are integrated, including dedicated support for mental health, trauma counselling, substance misuse, and pathways to secure permanent housing. Specialist staff trained in handling domestic abuse and violence against women are essential.

Glasgow must lead in protecting its most vulnerable. We call on you to act now to invest in and commission safe, dignified, and comprehensive emergency accommodation that truly meets the needs of homeless women and children. Their safety and futures depend on it.

Dear Lauren McNamara,

I am writing to urge the Scottish Government to address the housing emergency by adopting and funding emergency homeless accommodation for women, modelled on the proven success of The Welcome Centre in Belfast.

The current reliance on unsuitable and isolating hotel and B&B placements for women facing homelessness is both a poor short-term solution and a costly long-term strategy. These placements often lack crucial, targeted support, leaving vulnerable women at risk and unable to break the cycle of homelessness.

The Welcome Centre in Belfast offers a transformative alternative. As a purpose-built, women-only facility, it provides not just a safe room, but integrated support including psychological services, life skills training, and dedicated help with securing permanent housing. This holistic, trauma-informed approach stabilises lives and creates a clear pathway out of homelessness.

Although moving to this model requires initial capital and revenue funding, it reduces long-term costs to the NHS, justice system, and social services by addressing the root causes of homelessness, rather than merely managing its symptoms.

The Welcome Organisation, funded by the Housing Executive of Northern Ireland which is part of the Department of Communities headed by the Minister of Communities, is a clear template for successful women-only accommodation in Scotland.

The Welcome Organisation have two projects that provide women-only homeless accommodation.

Glenview, a “crash” facility which currently provides emergency homeless accommodation for women who have complex needs and have been homeless on the streets of Belfast. It has recently been expanded from 10 places to 28 places for women.

The Glenview facility is located within a large building within the grounds of a large hospital in Belfast. It has 28 en-suite bedrooms. On each floor, there is a communal kitchen and living room for residents. There is also a needle exchange.

The current funding of Glenview was currently £300,000 per year for 10 women and would rise to £800,000 per year to support 28 women. This is all grant-funded through the Supporting People Programme.

Catherine House, named after a homeless woman who died on the streets of Belfast, is run by a team of female workers headed by Ms J Girvan. Women may reside at this

facility for up to two years. The approach is person centred: the woman each receive a personal support plan and take part in activities such as counselling for addiction and mental health and courses to build up their independent living skills and boost their confidence and mental wellbeing. Other informal social activities take place involving volunteers.

These women are further along on their homeless journey and will reach a stage where they can secure permanent homes. The facility has had a high rate of success. I had the opportunity to speak to service users, who told me Catherine House had saved their lives. It is important to note that all men are barred from these protected spaces for women.

We met with Susan Duncan (Head of Operations at Glenview) and Colin McCloy (Homeless Project Team Manager) and Sheenaz Ahmadnia (Project Officer) of the Housing Executive of Northern Ireland.

Colin McCloy stated that the costs of supported women-only homeless accommodation were the same as placing women in "non-standard" (hotel and b&b) accommodation in Belfast; it is therefore more cost effective to operate a preventative model of women-only accommodation with wrap-around support for women in terms of starting to help them deal with their complex needs, including addiction, mental health, and domestic violence of all forms.

To understand the operational and financial benefits firsthand, I strongly recommend that you or the Housing Minister speak directly with the Northern Ireland Housing Executive. Colin McCloy can provide invaluable insight into how this model improves outcomes and delivers better value for public money.

By investing in specialist, supported women-only accommodation, we can provide safety and dignity for vulnerable women while building a more efficient and compassionate system. I implore you to explore this effective solution.

Under considerationPE2147: Create more women-only homeless accommodation that protects and meets the specific needs of women

Calling on the Scottish Parliament to urge the Scottish Government to reform homeless services in Scotland and ensure services protect women from sexual assault and exploitation by increasing funding and supporting the creation of more women-only homeless accommodation.

Background information

Increasing numbers of women are placed in unsuitable hotel/bed and breakfast accommodation, where there is a ratio of 14 men to 1 woman.

There is a clear lack of safeguarding in emergency temporary accommodation in general, but very little attention has been paid to the specific challenges faced by women who are stuck in the homeless system. Women are particularly at risk in mixed-sex emergency accommodation, and the hotels are notorious, with increased reports of rapes and sexual assaults.

We need secure women-only halfway accommodation that meets the specific needs of women with the objective of rapidly placing them in permanent social housing.

As part of the Glasgow Times “End the Homeless Hotel Shame” campaign, and with official figures suggesting that the number of families living in homeless hotels and B&Bs quadrupled in 2024, we support calls for more emphasis to be placed on the affordable housing supply budget.

I am contacting anyone I can who can help to push this, but I may need advice and guidance going forward.

Martha Wardrop of the Green Party raised the issue of women's safety in the hotels with Glasgow City Council back in April 2024 but was shot down by Cllr Alan Casey and has, to my knowledge, not raised it since. She told us on two occasions that would support the call for single-sex emergency accommodation. I have just requested another meeting with her to ask for her support.

Since we last spoke, the number of women and children in substandard hotel/bnb accommodation has risen steadily to record rates. The figures in Glasgow dipped slightly (from 383 women to 303) after the introduction of the Simon Community Connect Hub, which helps women to navigate the homeless system. The latest figures, however, show the numbers have risen sharply again, confirming our concerns that

such projects amount to sticking a plaster on a wound. We urgently need secure, single-sex halfway accommodation that meets the specific needs of women and their children with the aim of rapid rehousing.

The number of (mostly young) people staying in hotels continues to rise. The conditions in the hotels are hugely detrimental to anyone's mental and physical wellbeing.

The ratio of men to women is roughly 14:1. Despite this, roughly 25% of the deaths in hotels have been women, which means that the death rate among women is significantly higher. I believe that this is because women self-exclude from homeless services to a huge extent out of fear and that, at the point that women enter emergency accommodation, they have already reached breaking point. At their most vulnerable, they are being placed in an unspeakably dangerous and damaging environment.

I am currently working with a few journalists and trying to collect as much evidence in the form of testimonies from women who have experience of staying in the hotels.

I will continue to update you about the campaign.

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Introduction

This paper provides the IJB Public Engagement Committee (PEC) with a briefing on the approach taken by the Health and Social Care Partnership (HSCP) to meeting the accommodation needs of women affected by homelessness. The paper also sets out factors that informed the HSCP's decision not to designate specific bed and breakfast establishments for the sole use of women and families with children.

Background

IJB PEC Members will be aware that in [May 2026](#) the IJB agreed a 10-year Homelessness Temporary Accommodation Strategy. A key element of the Strategy is a commitment to end the routine use of bed and breakfast accommodation for the provision of emergency accommodation for homeless households. A number of workstreams are being progressed in order to make progress with reducing the use of bed and breakfast accommodation. The HSCP is taking forward actions to:

- Increase prevention of homelessness activity;
- Increase the number of permanent lets secured for the resettlement of homeless households from the city's Registered Social Landlord's (RSL);
- Work is at an advanced stage on a tender to significantly increase the number of temporary furnished flats through the Private Rented Sector as an alternative to bed and breakfast accommodation.

The HSCP is conscious of the gendered nature of homelessness and how the distinct needs of women impact on their experience of homelessness services. As a result, the HSCP has continuously worked with colleagues across the voluntary and statutory sector to ensure there is a wide range of accommodation and support services that reflect the needs of women experiencing homelessness. This provision includes:

- Women-only supported accommodation
- Integrated gender sensitive practices
- Gender specific support services (e.g. Martha's Mammies)
- Prioritisation of allocation of Temporary Furnished Accommodation to Women and Families.
- Beyond the provision of single supported accommodation, the service has access to over 2,400 temporary furnished properties that we use to accommodate women.

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Due to the unsuitability of bed and breakfast type establishments to accommodate women and children, the HSCP has long worked to minimise its use. However, due to the significant increase in demand for homelessness assistance since July 2023, the HSCP has increased use of this type of accommodation to provide emergency accommodation at the point of initial presentation. **Table 1** provides an overview of the increase in homeless applications between May 2023 and May 2024.

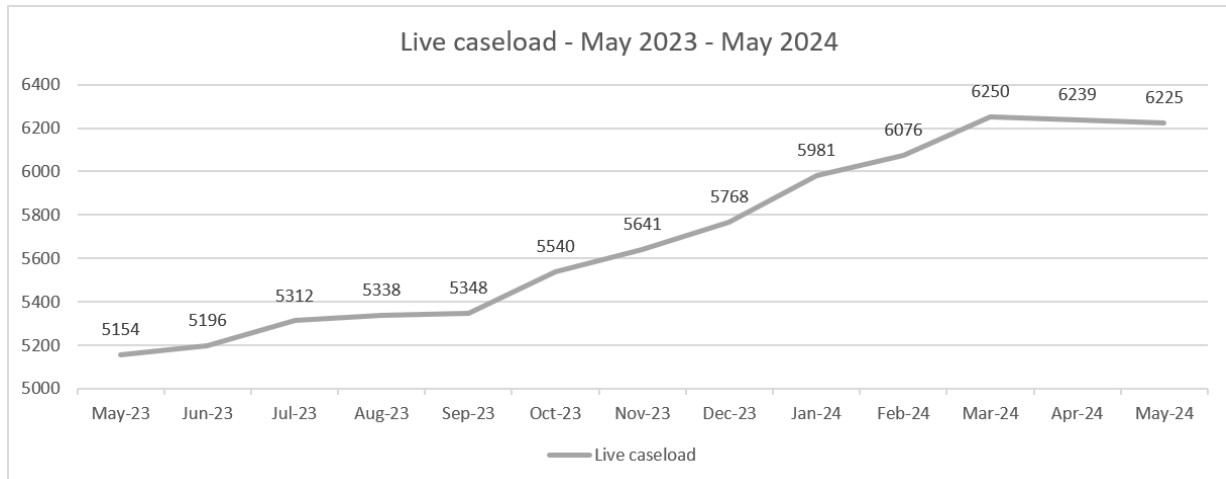
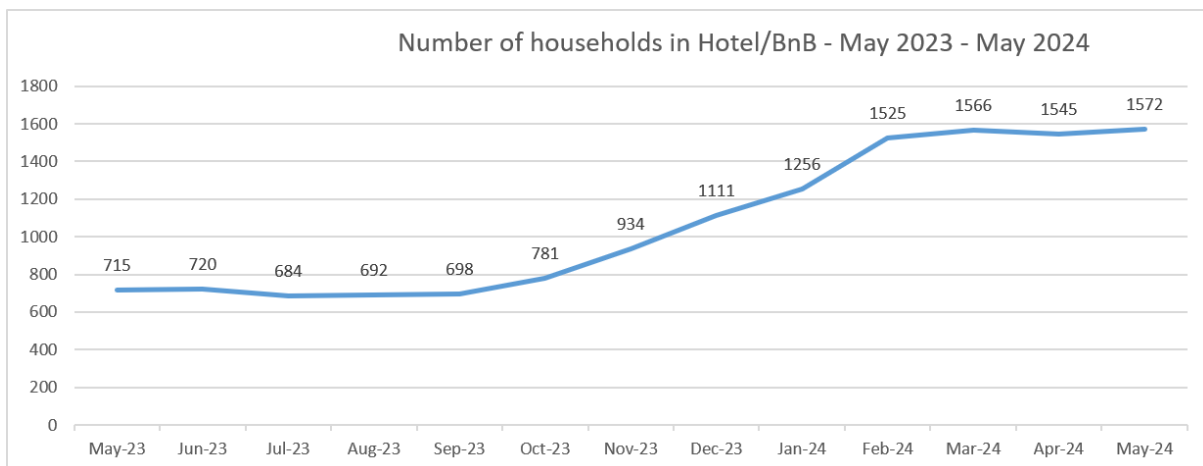


Table 2 provides an overview of the increase in the number of households in bed and breakfast between May 2023 and May 2024. It is important to note that the increase in bed and breakfast use for accommodating homeless households has continued to increase.



In response to the increase in demand for emergency and temporary accommodation, the HSCP is taking a number of actions to increase the supply of alternatives to bed and breakfast type accommodation. However, given the extent of the increased demand for emergency accommodation from homeless households it is likely that the HSCP will continue to have a reliance on bed and breakfast type accommodation for an extended period. Subsequently, in March 2024 the HSCP examined the safeguarding arrangements for women and families placed in bed and breakfast type accommodation.

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Positives

Designating a specific bed and breakfast for the sole use of women and children could have a number of benefits in relation to the provision of support. These include:

- Concentrating single women in a single accommodation resource would allow the HSCP to target support to families within the service.
- Excluding single males from an establishment may improve the safety of the families and single women.
- Families may develop support networks that they may not otherwise be able to form due to isolation in other establishments.
- Consideration could be given to choosing an establishment located in a high amenity area with good public transport links.

Negatives

Alternatively designating a specific bed and breakfast that the HSCP currently procures for emergency accommodation for the sole use of homeless women could pose a number of risks in relation to the welfare of the families accommodated within the service. These include:

- Designating a single establishment may undermine the safety of residents if the function of the establishment became widely known and predatory individuals began to target the accommodation. Domestic abuse is a driver of homelessness and our attempts to improve supports to families and single women in bed and breakfast may undermine our work to protect families at risk of domestic abuse.
- Operating a dispersed model for placing families and women in bed and breakfast provides families with a degree of choice in relation to emergency accommodation placements. Concentrating provision within one establishment may undermine a family's ability to sustain social networks and links to nursery and school placements.
- Whilst women may develop positive social networks within a single sex environment the opposite may also be true where residents may develop relationships which may be exploitative and undermine their resilience and parenting skills, as placing households in one establishment based on the criteria of gender, within the context of significant pressures on placements, may mean that the Homelessness Service cannot adopt a more flexible approach to placements in order that vulnerable women and children are not placed with women with more chaotic lifestyles.

Having made the operational decision not to designate specific bed and breakfast type accommodation for women and children, the HSCP undertook a number of actions to improve placement oversight and safeguarding arrangements, these include:

- Homelessness Management Women and Family Accommodation Oversight Meeting.
- Gender and family sensitive approach to the use of particular bed and breakfast establishments.

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- Guidance to staff in relation to the allocation of emergency accommodation.
- Guidance to Social Care staff in relation to gender based violence.
- Guidance to Hotel establishments in relation to the reporting gender-based violence incidents and safeguarding issues in relation to women service users.
- Investment in Trauma Informed Practice Development Programme informed by a gendered analysis of trauma and homelessness.

Summary

The HSCP has carefully considered whether specific bed and breakfast establishments should be designated exclusively for women and children experiencing homelessness. While this approach may appear to offer additional reassurance, the HSCP has concluded that a dispersed placement model provides greater flexibility, choice and safeguarding benefits. Designating a single establishment could unintentionally increase risks to residents by making accommodation locations more identifiable, reduce households' ability to remain connected to existing support networks, schools and local services, and limit the HSCP's capacity to respond effectively to changing levels of demand for emergency accommodation. For these reasons, the HSCP has focused on strengthening safeguarding arrangements and support provision across all accommodation settings rather than creating women and family only bed and breakfast establishments.
