**Whole Family Support through General Practice (WFSGP) Programme Expansion**

<b>Purpose of Report:</b>	The purpose of the report is to update the Integration Joint Board on the offer of additional Scottish Government funding to double the whole family support through general practice (WFSGP) test programme, and to request approval of the expenditure.
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<b>Background/Engagement:</b>	<p>Members approved a test programme working with 12 Deep End Practices in <a href="#">May 2024</a>. The test is being externally evaluated with very promising initial findings for families, General practice and community supports.</p> <p>The WFSGP test has been featured in the newly launched national <a href="#">Child Poverty Delivery Plan - Bringing Hope, Building Futures (2026-31)</a>. Further investment was announced as part of the delivery plan to double the programme within Glasgow City for the next three years (2026-29), and trail taking the approach into another part of Scotland.</p>

**Implications for Health and Social Care Partnership:**

<b>Reference to National Health &amp; Wellbeing Outcome(s):</b>	Outcome 1 – People are able to look after and improve their own health and wellbeing and live in good health for longer.

### 1. Purpose

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is to update the Integration Joint Board on the proposed expansion of the Whole Family Support through General Practice (WFSGP) programme and to seek approval to implement and manage the additional Scottish Government funding for the period 2026/27 to 2028/29, building on the existing test programme.

### 2. Background

- 2.1 The Scottish Whole Family Wellbeing Fund (WFWF) Programme was established in 2021/22 with the aim of improving family wellbeing, reducing inequalities, preventing crisis intervention, and reducing the number of children living away from home. Through this programme, GCHSCP was supported to test a whole-family approach within primary care, embedding dedicated Family

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Wellbeing Workers (FWWs) in 12 Deep End practices to provide holistic, early and non-stigmatising support to families. Members approved the approach and expenditure for this initial two year test of change in May 2024; this test is now funded till March 2027.

2.2 Glasgow hosts 72 of the 100 most deprived GP practices in Scotland, placing GPs in daily contact with families who may not present to other services. Evidence from the test of change has shown:

- 375 families engaged in the programme in the first 13 months, despite only part-time FWW capacity in each participating practice. There are multiple family members supported within each family.
- Within the first year of operation there is a waiting list for engagement with FWW's, 8 of the 12 practices now have families waiting to be seen, demonstrating unmet need.
- There is a 95% engagement rate from the families referred to the FWW's, demonstrating that General Practice is a trusted intermediary to reach families.
- Families frequently face compounded issues: poverty, poor mental health, isolation, trauma, ASN needs, language barriers and insecure housing.
- GPs, Community Link Workers, Health Visitors and others report that the FWW role adds unique value by bridging families to supports otherwise difficult to navigate or access.

2.3 The test programme is being independently evaluated through the University of Glasgow. Although early days significant improvements in parental mental wellbeing (change in mean Short Warwick - Edinburgh Mental Wellbeing Scale (SWEMWBS) score from 19.2 at entry to service to 23.7 at exit of service – difference 4.5, 95% confidence interval 1.9 - 7.2, p-value = 0.003) are already being found. Encouraging qualitative evidence shows that families benefit from the FWW's persistent, relational, and whole-family approach, combining practical support with advocacy and local knowledge.

2.4 On 12th March 2026, the Scottish Government launched their third national [Child Poverty Delivery Plan - Bringing Hope, Building Futures \(2026-31\)](#). The WFSGP test programme was featured as a practical whole family approach with great promise in tackling child poverty. Further investment was announced to expand the programme within Glasgow City over the next three years, and trail taking the approach into another part of Scotland.

### 3. WFSGP Expansion proposal

3.1 The additional award enables a doubling of the current test programme, reaching at least a further 500 families (1,500 family members) and builds on the learning so far through the component parts outlined below.

- Enhanced Family Wellbeing Capacity in General Practice:
  - ✓ Additional part-time FWWs across 12 new practices
  - ✓ A peripatetic FWW capacity to support higher referring practices

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- ✓ Continued integration with GPs, CLWs, HVs, school nursing teams and early years services
- ✓ Dedicated training in trauma-informed practice, GIRFE and family asset-building
- Proactive Identification of Priority Families by building on GP data systems and improve monitoring of impact on child poverty drivers.
- Strengthened Prevention and Early Intervention Pathways by extending provision across the 12 new practices for:
  - ✓ Thrive Under Five – early years food insecurity and nutrition programme
  - ✓ Youth Health Service – for 12yrs+ young people to receive clinical and social support
  - ✓ Live Well community referral for parents/carers – to support the well-being of parents/carers
  - ✓ Reading and play programmes for early years healthy development
  - ✓ Children’s club budgets enabling access to protective clubs for young people and extending provisions for ASN children
- Critical mitigation supports will be expanded to meet rising demand:
  - ✓ Access to financial advice by basing advisors in the participating practices and extending the offer to include broader financial capacity building
  - ✓ Dedicated trauma support for parents, delivered in partnership with third-sector specialists particularly for childhood trauma, childhood sexual abuse and domestic violence
  - ✓ Young People Befriending Support providing community-based support to 8-18 year olds living in Glasgow, enabling positive relationships, particularly for very isolated young people.
  - ✓ Initial scoping housing responses- a year 1 cost is included to undertake a piece of work to review and consider the plethora of housing issues already arising through the WFSGP programme to frame a way for these to be handled and supported through the extended programme, in liaison with the housing sector.
- Community Family Support, learning from the test programme Whole Family Community Fund will shape:
  - ✓ Local micro-grants for family activities
  - ✓ Peer-led family support and parental wellbeing groups
  - ✓ Culturally appropriate supports for minority ethnic, asylum seeker and refugee families
  - ✓ Support for families with disabled children and parents under 25

## 4. Finance

- 4.1 Specific Scottish Government funding has been awarded to Glasgow City Council for this development of £1.8m for 2026/27 (award letter received) and £1.8m for 2027/28 and 2028/29 (subject to parliamentary approval). The allocation will be aligned to each of the programme areas in Table 1 as

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approved with Scottish Government, with management through the Integration Authority.

### 5. Outcomes

- 5.1 The expansion aims to improve the well-being of families through improving household income and reducing financial stress, strengthening parental mental wellbeing and confidence, and enhancing children's development, learning and overall wellbeing, while reducing isolation and building stronger community connections.
- 5.2 The programme will also support general practice by reducing non-clinical demand, enabling earlier identification of family risk, and strengthening multidisciplinary responses to complex need. At a system level, it will contribute to stronger alignment between primary care, children's services and community provision, alongside improved data and evidence on the drivers of child poverty and family need.

### 6. Governance

- 6.1 A steering group was set up for the test programme and has included membership from General Practice, Children's Services, the Child Poverty Programme team (GCC), Health Improvement, the third sector, the Primary Care division and Glasgow Life and reports into the Children's Services Executive Group. This provides the oversight and recommendations to progress the test programme and the expansion.
- 6.2. This work is of considerable national interest and will be reported through the Deep End Network, the national Health Inequalities work of the Primary Care Division and be more broadly reporting within the annual Local Child Poverty Delivery Report (LCPAR) for Glasgow City and the Community Planning Performance Framework (focusing on reducing family poverty).

### 7. Recommendations
