1. Purpose

1.1. The purpose of this report is to update the IJB Finance, Audit and Scrutiny Committee about the report published by the Independent National Whistleblowing Officer (INWO) on 30th April 2025 and the HSCP's response to this.

2. Background

- 2.1. INWO carried out an investigation into a complaint it received concerning a decision to reduce specialist GP services at Hunter Street for people experiencing homelessness in Glasgow. The practice was closed in April 2023.
- 2.2. The complaint to INWO followed an investigation of a whistleblowing concern raised with NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde in 2023 which was not upheld at Stage 2 of their whistleblowing procedure which concluded in September 2023.
- 2.3. The INWO investigated 4 specific elements in respect of the complaint, these being that the HSCP unreasonably failed to:
 - Follow a meaningful process of engagement and consultation with staff involved in the affected service prior to the decision
 - Carry out meaningful stakeholder consultation prior to the decision
 - Perform a full and timely assessment of risk and equalities impact
 - Take action to address long term risks associated with the decision
- 2.4. INWO published its final report on this investigation on <u>30th April 2025</u> with all 4 elements of the complaint being upheld. The report also asked the HSCP to implement a number of recommendations as a result of these findings.

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3. Communication with the IJB

- 3.1. Following publication of the final report on 30th April 2025, the HSCP prepared a briefing to the IJB, Health Board and External Stakeholders acknowledging and accepting the INWO's decision and recommendations (this was included as an attachment to the FASC report on 11th June 2025).
- 3.2. The Chief Officer provided a verbal update to the IJB at its meeting on 14th May 2025 on the INWO's final report and confirmed that a more detailed report would be presented to this Committee as well as a discussion held at a future IJB Development Session.
- 3.3. A report to this Committee on 11th June 2025 set out the timeline of the correspondence between the HSCP and INWO in respect of the draft and final reports, as well as providing information on the planned activity by the HSCP to address the recommendations in the final published report.
- 3.4. Discussion led by the Chief Officer on the INWO report was originally scheduled for the IJB Development Session on 18th June 2025, however due to other priority business this was held over to the session on 3rd September 2025.

4. Update on HSCP Response to INWO

- 4.1. The HSCP committed to carrying out the recommendations identified by the INWO and has completed the necessary work to address Recommendations 1 and 2 within the timescales set out in the final report. The action taken and evidence provided to INWO in respect of Recommendations 1 and 2 were submitted on 23rd June 2025 and are detailed in Appendix A.
- 4.2. Recommendation 3 had two elements, the first of which (evidence that a Health Needs Assessment has been fully scoped and a plan is in place) was required to be submitted by 25th June 2025. A commissioning plan for a Health Needs Assessment was included in the submission on 23rd June 2025.
- 4.3. Following submission on 23rd June 2025, correspondence from INWO was received by NHS GGC and the GCHSCP Chief Officer on 1st July 2025 confirming that a review of the evidence had been undertaken and INWO were satisfied to sign off Recommendations 1 and 2, and the first element of Recommendation 3 as complete. INWO also advised that they would confirm this to the complainant at their request.
- 4.4. The remaining element of Recommendation 3 (completion of Health Needs Assessment) is due to be submitted by 28th October. Officers have confirmed that this is on target for completion by the required deadline.
